

The Roswell Park Oishei Children's Cancer and Blood Disorders Program is a collaboration with Kaleida Health's John R. Oishei Children's Hospital and Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center.

About the Program

As one of only three programs of its kind available nationally, the Roswell Park Oishei Children's Cancer and Blood Disorder Program offers pediatric cancer and blood disorder patients the expertise of a joint program based at a NCI-Designated Comprehensive Cancer Center, as well as the benefits of a state-of-the-art, freestanding children's hospital. Within this program, patients and families in our region benefit from coordinated oncology and hematology care, including diagnosis, treatment, follow-up and survivorship care; care for sickle cell disease and disorders of the blood clotting system; blood and marrow transplants; access to new and emerging diagnosis and treatment approaches, including psychosocial oncology, child life care, social work and nutritional counseling; and so much more.



"Before Roswell Park and Kaleida Health came together, unfortunately, a good percentage of our patients had to leave the area for some of the specialized care that's particularly important for children with cancer," said Kara Kelly, MD, director of the Roswell Park Oishei Children's Cancer & Blood Disorders Program.

Our care team could not do a fraction of their expansive work without philanthropy. Donations allow our team to perform studies on new treatments, paving the way for additional funding. As it stands, the national agency responsible for researching cancer allots only 4 percent of their budget to pediatric cancer, leaving a large gap that is filled through philanthropy. Combined with OCH's commitment to treating every child that walks through our doors, even those with low-reimbursement like Medicaid, philanthropic support is needed to help OCH keep treating *all* of our community's youngest fighters.
